All Applicants:

You are not bound to the specific courses you list above; the purpose of this is to demonstrate that you understand how the requirements of the concentration are structured and what a logical sequence of coursework would be. ***Please refer to the requirement checklist for each area on the VES Website if you are uncertain of a typical sequence (available on the [Forms page of the website](#)).*** The VES Honors Board, the group of VES faculty who will vet this application, will base its decision partly on your plan.

Applicants to VES are considered for admission after having taken at least one course in the department in their proposed area of focus or track (i.e, a film/video production course for the film/video production track, a studio arts course for the studio arts track, etc.) or be in the process of taking one, and whose overall grade point average to date is not below B (3.0). This application assumes that you have read Fields of Concentration regarding VES requirements as well General Education requirements.

Joint Concentration Applicants Only:

A student wishing to combine VES with another concentration must present, ***in addition to this application, a written explanation to the VES Honors Board, describing how bringing together the two concentrations will produce a viable synthesis and a joint senior thesis.*** Having interests in, or taking courses in, two fields is not sufficient: a joint concentration must eventuate in a senior thesis acceptable to both departments, and integrating the work done in each.

The Honors Board will consider the persuasiveness of the case made for joint concentration based upon 1) the explanation of how and why the two fields are to be combined, including plans for the senior thesis; 2) the student’s list of proposed courses, and 3) the availability and assent of a qualified VES adviser.
